If I am elected president of the Chicago district council of the Brotherhood of Carpenters and Joiners of America, I shall unceasingly oppose the vicious Landis Award decisions and work for the 100-per cent unionization of all the carpenters' jobs in Chicago.

Harry Jensen has been more interested in disrupting the union by suspending locals and vilifying progressives than in doing this necessary work of organization. As his successor, I shall concentrate in building up our great organization.

I believe in freedom of speech in union affairs. I am opposed to the persecution by suspensions, expulsions or otherwise, of union members who advocate independent political action, amalgamation or any other policies which they believe to be to the interest of the workers.

They were forced to wait two hours, and then turned away.

All Crafts Joining Fight for Striking Printers

SEATTLE, June 13.—Boycott of the Seattle Post-Intelligencer, morning daily owned by William Randolph Hearst, is proceeding among unions of the northwest.

Local street car men organized in Division 587 have threatened Hearst with withdrawal of 1,500 readers if he does not make terms with the striking printers and locked-out stereotypers and mailers by signing the same contract that is in force in all the other daily newspaper offices in Seattle.

After months of negotiation the Hearst paper refused to sign. Meanwhile it had held a squadron of strikebreakers in readiness who marched in from Los Angeles and a Spokane printers' school and are trying to get out the paper.
