The Ford Company will offer "experi advice and guidance" on what types o gardening should be engaged in. For those who have no back yards garden plots will be "provided" by the company -at substantial rentals, of course.

Mr. Ford declared that his plan was scheme of "self-help, which, if adopted thruout the country, would do away with any thought of the dole" (government unemployment relief).

The wages of those who work are harely enough to keep them alive and work ing, but when they demand a small increase, when they demand that some of the products which are being destroyed be given to them instead, not only are their demands rejected, but they are starved back by hunger or driven back at the end of the gun (the strikes of the miners in Ohio, Pennsylvania, West Virginia and Kentucky, the strike of the silk workers in Paterson). In many cases they are shot down or thrown into jail and framed-up for long jail terms. And yet, so plentiful are the necessities which these workers demand, that millions of dollars worth of them are being deliberately destroyed regularly! Can a better proof be given of the necessity for overthrowing the capitalist system which is the cause of such a condition?

> The proposal of the Farm Board is an expression of the manner in which the capitalist class intends to solve the present crisis. It is not an isolated case. The destruction of commodities in order to raise prices has been a regular practice of capitalism. But in the past, this was done on a rather small scale, and by individual capitalists or groups of capitalists This is the first time that the capitalist class as a whole, thru its spokesman, the government, has dared to make such a proposal publicly and to propose destruction on such a wide scale. Cotton, of course, is not the only thing involved. In Oklahoma and Texas there is today martial law. Everywhere are troops with fixed hayonets, machine guns and poison gas. A war? No! FRANK HARRIS IS **DEAD IN FRANCE**

Great Author Succumbs At 75; Had Just Completed A Biography Of Shaw

NICE, France. - Frank Harris, the great biographer, editor, critic, playwright and author, died here early on the moraing of August 26, after a week's painful Encis. He was 75 years old.

Frank Harris was born in Ireland on February 14, 1856. At the age of 14 he won a scholarship prize for Cambridge University but was denied it because of his youth. He replied by running away to America, practically penniless. In New York he became a boothlack, a porter, a general laborer and finally a sand-hog during the construction of Brook-The experience he gained lyn Bridge. in this last iob he later wove into his book "The Bomb,"

He then pushed on to Chicago where he became first a hotel clerk and later a hotel manager. As a result of confacts with cattlemen in Chicago, he drifted to the cow country where he became a cowboy. This phase of his life was later made the subject of a book of reminiscen-

Only Public Works Plan Proposed; Signs New **Immunity Bills**

ALBANY-Every form of immediate government relief to the unemployed i rigidly excluded from the proposals forwarded on the unemployment situation by Governor Franklin D. Roosevelt to the State Legislature meeting here in extraordinary session. Instead, the Gover nor recommends the raising of a fund of \$20,000,000 to be used largely for public works on a state and local scale. The fund is to be raised by a 50% increase in income tax rate, general in scope and not limited to the higher brackets.

But MacDonald's program produced an outburst of indignant resentment on the part of the milions of workers organized in the trade unions and supporting the Labor party. The trade union leaders, and the bulk of the Lahor party leaders, feeling the pressure of the resentment of the masses and realizing that to support MacDonald would mean to break their connections with the labor movement, strongly opposed the MacDonald program and the Labor Cabinet was deadlocked. Finally MacDonald took the fateful step. On Monday, August 24, he forced the resignation of the Labor Cabinet and immediately set to work building up a coalition cabinet based on the anti-labor finan-cial program dictated by Wall Street and the London bankers. A new Cabinet was immediately formed with MacDonald at the head, composed of ten members, four of the former Labor Cabinet, four Tories and two Liberals. The sole plank in the platform of this new government is to shift the burdens of financial crisis on to the shoulders of the workers. As soon as the budget is completed, the coalition government will dissolve and new elections held.

The hand of Wall Street, pulling the strings behind the scenes, was strikingly visible thruout the proceedings, Ernest Thurtle, former Junior Lord of the Treasury, informed the Daily Herald of London that "Mr. MacDonald at his interview with the junior ministers on Monday last told them that the proposals which the government had submitted to the Bank of England had to be telephoned to America to see if they could be approved there." The new National Cabinet and its program has met with the bitterest opposition of the official labor bodies in England. Tom Morgan's two elder sons are following in the footsteps of their father. George, 24 years, and Raymond, 22 years old. They aer both weavers. Both have been of the picket line every day since the strike began. They are both captains of the picket line and have been arrested three times so far. Raymond carries a fractured wrist which he incurred as a result of speaking to a couple of scabs. But that's wot saying what happened to the scabs. George had a tib broken in the fight to break the Doherty injunction against picketing and had to be taken to the hospital. The three of them, father and two sons, are back again on the fighting picket line. "Only one thing can stop us and many more of our fellow workers, and that is hunger. 

USSR and World Revolution

by Jay Lovestone

(Continued from last issue) Duranty Slanders Stalin

No matter how severely critical we may be and will continue to be of Stalin's ultra-left sectarian policies in the Communist International, still we cannot agree with Duranty when he says:

"But facts are facts, whether one admits them or not, and it is quite on the cards that the real source of the quarrel of Trotsky and foreign Marxist theoreticians with Stalinism; while retaining world revolution as an itlimate goal, has abandoned it as an immediate practical issue little less completely than the early Christian Church abandoned the millenium or second advent when Constantine made it the official faith of the Roman Empire." (New York Times, June 18, 1931).

Somehow or other, no bourgeois thinker can rise above the lowest levels of thinking-faith and mysticism, which are the very antithesis of thinking. What Bolshevism--- based on the stern realities of the class war--has to do with the fantastic concepts of any species of supernaturalism, it is impossible for anyone to fathom. Still, Duranty tries to be "dialectical." And here we see what happens to dialectics in the hands of non-Marxists-a mere shuffling of the cards. Says

"The evolution of Stalinism toward 'Soviet Socialist sufficiency' at first made it important to retain such sources of support abroad as the foreign Communist parties ofigered, and there was a period when the foreign Communist parties were severely disciplined by Moscow to time them exactly to the Krentin's note. America is a case, in point, as Messrs, Lovestone and Pepper will bear witness." (New York Times, June 19, 1921).

Mr. Duranty is all wrong. No one will deny that Stalin's factional methods, both in the Communist Party of the Soviet Union and in the Communist International, that the factional regime, its clique boasting and burocratic perversion of correct tactical policies with the consequent weakening of the Communist International, have given to bourgeois critics and experts, basing themselves on temporary and superficial phenomena plenty of talking points for such inventions and crudities as the idea that the Soviet Union is no longer interested in the world revolution and is concerned only with the problems of Soviet economic construction. Whatever be the criticism we may level against Stalin, yet we never stoop to deny that it was none other than Stalin himself, who clearly said, in reply to Trotsky, at the Seventh Enlarged Plenum of the Executive Committee of the Communist International in December 1926, that:

the interests and lasks of the pro-letariat of the U.S.S.R. are interwoven and inseparably connected with the inter-ests and the tasks of the revolutionary movement in all countries, and vice versa, the tasks of the revolutionary proletariat of all countries are inseparably connected with the tasks and achievements of the prole-tariat of the U.S.S.R. on the front of Socialist construction."

Regardless of how much the capitalists may wish, the fact remains that the Communist Party of the Soviet Union, whether its outstanding leader be Bukharin, Stalin, or who not, fully recognizes the truth of Lenin's remarks at the XIII Party Congress:

"We live not only in a state, but in a system of states, and the existence of the Soviet Republic side by side with imperialist states for any length of time is inconceivable. Finally one or the other must conquer."

But Duranty would have us believe

"As Soviet Russia has grown stronger and the need for such allies (the Third International) has decreased, here has been a progressive concentration of Russian interest upon internal affairs and—whether Communical zealots like it or not—a progressive dilution of the importance of the Third International." (New York Times, July 25, 1931) Times, July 25, 1931).

At the very moment that the Com munist International was organized Lenin who was its founder, said that the Third International was set up

"to carry out, to put into practice the beliests of Marxism and to make the old ideals of Socialism and of the labor movement a reality; this most characteristic feature of the Third International immecasure of the Third International immediately asserted liself by the fact that the new, third 'International Workingmen's Association' began to coincide to a certain extent with the Union of Socialist Sovier Republics."

Stalinites In a Bourgeois Pitfall

In the present situation the role of the Communist International is decisive, Stalin knows this. The fact that Stalin's ultradeft sectarian tactics in the Communist International have brought paralysis to the Comintern, particularly in the present moment of splendid opportunities for revolutionary struggle against capitalism, does not mean that his intentions are had or that his plans are to sacrifice the world revolution. It does mean that his present policies in the Communist International are wrong, are bad

Apparently, the bourgeois critics of the Soviet Union, like some of the leader ships imposed on the various sections of the Communist International, (for example, in the United States), think that the international revolution is a single act. For opposite reasons, of course, the wish is father to the thought with both of With one the process of failure; with the other, the process of success. That is why those who mechanically transplant policies from the Soviet Union, as well as those "friendly" bourgeois critics who are always sure that in the end the U. S. S. R. will get to capitalism, both fail to understand the recent speech of Stalin about new tactics and plans in the improvement of the Soviet labor supply. Thus, the Daily Worker has actually kept silent until very recently, about this very important speech while the general bourgeois press stupidly hailed it as "a retreat from Communism and a return to capitalism". The trouble is that both view the internation. al revolution as a single act and that try. The lowest rung in the ladder is oc

cannot produce justice and equality; dif-ferences, and unjust differences in wealth, will still exist.

"But the exploitation of one man by many will have become impossible, to seize as private property the means of produc-tion, the factories, machines, land, etc." (State and Revolution).

An Old Menshevik Fairy Tale

The theory of Duranty that the her-culcan efforts and success of the Communist Party of the Soviet Union in its progress in Socialist construction mean giving up the international social revoution, the discarding of the Communist International, or that the tasks of the Soviet proletariat in building Socialism are in conflict with the tasks of the inernational proletariat in destroying capitalism, is really not a new theory. It is merely the other side of the medal, another phase, or the corollary, of that theory of Kautsky, Bauer, Parvus and Hillquit to the effect that "the realization of the Socialist revolution and Socialist construction are impossible" except on an international scale in general, and in the U.S.S.R. in particular. According to these bourgeois writers "the historical mission of the Bolsheviks is to serve as a bridge by which a Caesar or a Bonaparto or someone similar will come to power. And Trotsky spoke of Thermidor, Dut anty concludes that this is already what

has happened, that "Stalinism is an iron

scepter", that Stalin is a sort of a Tam

erlane ruling the U.S.S.R. with an

iron, Czarist hand. It is not an accident that this most dangerous propaganda against the Soviet Union appears, in a new garb it is true, just at a moment when the bourgeoisie of even the strongest imperialist powers are weak in the knees and sick in the head. For the American bourgeoisie Duranty's propaganda--regardless of his intentions or plans—tends to serve as a tonic, giving hope and the illusion that he Soviet system may work in the U.S. S. R. all right but not in the United States, that the very progress of Socialist construction in the Soviet Union tends o liquidate the revolutionary role of the J. S. S. R. on an international scale. Obriously, these are real quack-remedies. slain patent-medicines for the doorned pourgeois order now in one of the most lecisive and significant crises in its vhole history.

Basic Dangers Before Us

What the Communists of all countries nust guard against with special vigilance, in these dying days of capitalism es a world system, is ultra-left sectamen-sm--adventurism. This is the most deadv enemy of the international Communist novement in its present decisive combat vith social reformism and Pascism—the wo guardians at the death-hed of the lecaving, but still far from dead, order of capitalist exploitation. Keeping this ask in mind we recall (and return paricularly to Stalin himself) the following excellent advice given by Stalin at the Seventh Enlarged Plenum of the Execuive Committee of the Communist International, in reply to the Trotskyists:

"... WHAT'S BEHIND EVENTS IN CHILE?

somewhat overshadowed the revolution. of June in the South American republic of Chile, the course of which is certain to have considerable effect upon the entire labor movement of the continent. Chile occupies the position of third rank, considered from an economic and political viewpoint, among Latin Americon countries. Chile is a country of coasts and hills: agriculture therefore does not play anywhere the same role in this country as it does in Argentina, for example. The chief forms of wealth are the nitrates and mineral deposits in the North and the highly developed industry built upon them. In the central rebig land-ownership is dominant gions. in the South, the remnants of the Indian aborigines, the Araukans, vegetate as small peasants.

Class Alignments and Class Antagonisms

Chile is today no longer a country of immigration, as is Argentina. Its population is primarily a mixture of Spaniards and Indians. A certain role is also played by the Germans, who make up the rich colonists and merchants. Class antagonisms are very sharply developed. At the top is a thin stratum of almost pureblooded Spanish lords of huge estates. closely connected with the commercial and financial aristocracy of German origin. Then follows a rather extensive layer of mediopelo (mixed blood), represented in the middle class strata, the intellectuals and the officialdom. Rotten and spiritually decadent as the Chilean aristocracy is, it allows its rule to be exercised thru upstarts from these classes.

The bottom of the pyramid is formed here, as everywhere, by the toiling masses. But in Chile the working masses assume a quite peculiar stamp, corresponding to the special conditions of the counneither type understands what Lenin cupied by the inquilinos, the descendmeant when he said in 1917:

The Labor Movement Chile's wealth is nitrates. During the World War, the industries built on nitrates rose to the highest importance and indeed all branches of industry were remarkably stimulated. Almost overnight a modern labor movement arose, pased primarily upon the mine workers.

About one billion dollars of American money is invested in Chile, primarily in nitrates, copper and railroads The military dictatorship in Chile was an openly awoved agency of Wall Street.

HE end of August has seen by far the lowest general level yet attained in the crisis. But the basic indices point to even worse weeks ahead. The usual autumn improvement, signs of which normally appear in August, is conspicuous for its absence. Competent observers are thus already writing off autumn seasonal prospects. The National Association of Purchasing Agents survey sees no improvement in sight. Uncertainties of crop size and consumption de-

prices downward. Rubber is touching the lowest in its history. Farm prices, dropping 33 points within the year have reached a general price level of 75% pre-war average. Despite price reductions the expect-

ed August upturn in autos has failed materialize and production has reached the lowest level in a decade. Unemployment is mounting steadily. The number of wage cuts is multiplying rapidly. Class I Railroad income income fell 32.6% in July. Building contract awards for the first half of August being 30% under the low daily July average and 60% below the August 1930 figures. Steel output, electric power production and cotton cloth manufacture fell during the week. Harris attended the University of Kansas and was ultimately admitted to the har of that state. Then he decided to devote himself to study and literature and left for Europe where he studied at Heidolberg, Goettingen, Strasbourg, Berlin, Vienna, Athens and Paris. After a brief period as war correspondent for the American press, he settled down in England where he edited and contributed to number of papers.

The years of 1908 to 1914 Frank Harris devated to his own writings. It was in this period that "The Bomb," "The Man Shakespeare", "The Women of Shakespeare", "The Yellow Ticket and Other Stories," etc. were published.

Finally he came to America and took up the editing of Pearson's Magazine. During the World War his radical leanings brought down the heavy hand of the government upon him and one issue of the magazine was banned by the Post Office Department while the others were closely watched. In this period, too, he conducted a vigorous activity as a critic of literature and att, by pen and word of month. His influence among the younger writers was very great.

He again left for Europe and began writing his memoirs. Soon his intensely interesting "My Life and Loves" appeared n three volumes and was of course banned in such highly moral countries as the United States and Great Britain. Harris's memoirs, however, immediately attained a wide circulation in spite, or perhaps because of the ban .

Among the most widely read of his works are his four volumes of "Con-temporary Portraits" and "Oscar Wilde, His Life and Confessions", which is ranked as one of the best literary biographies ever written.

Just before his death, Harris had finished a biography of George Bernard Shaw, the proofs of which are now in to deceive the masses. But the decisive Shaw's hands.

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SHIPWRECK

HE MacDonald government of England has collapsed. In view of the pres ent world crisis this event is of paramount international significance.

Only the silliest of fools can do, as the DAILY WORKER has done: dismiss the shipwrecking of the second Labor government as a mere manouver of the British imperialists, as merely a step in the general conspiracy of the ruling class against the toiling masses. Such a conception is a crude misconception. It flies in the face of facts. It is a crude perversion of Marxism, of the type which our sectarian comrades have been guilty of so frequently in the last two years.

Some twelve years ago Lenin branded MacDonald as a post master in "those smooth, well-sounding stereotyped phrases, Socialist in APPEARANCE, which in all advanced countries have served for a long time to screen bourgeois policies within the working class movement."

The rapid development of the world economic crisis has only stimulated the de cay of British imperialism, already evident before the present acute crisis. Today the contradictions of British capitalism have become more acute than ever. This was bound to have its political, its class reflections. This process of class realign ments, of deepening the fundamental class antagonisms and divisions, has been going on for a long time. The fall of the MacDonald government only marks a point of decisive turn, a moment of acceleration in the tempo and intensity of the class was in Great Britain. As Lenin has shown, MacDonald has for decades been a traitor to his class. It was none other than Winston Churchill who, only a month ago boasted about MacDonald: "He is the first Socialist Prime Minister we have ever had, and he has been Prime Minister twice over. Of course, he is not a Socialist. and is at this moment in active revolt against Socialism in all its forms" (SUNDAY PICTORIAL, July 26, 1931).

What has actually happened? British capitalism is in such desperate pligths that the bourgeoisie are compelled, in order to hold on to their profits, dividends and power, to sharpen the attack on the workers standards and conditions. Mac-Donald served the British bourgeoisie within the labor movement as long as the inperialist interests demanded it. But the new demands of the English exploiters on the laboring masses are so obviously outrageous and MacDonald's vencer of Socialist phrases and demogogy have become so thin that he could no longer historically serve as the lieutenant of capital INSIDE the ranks of labor. Most of the trade union burocrats in his cabinet, having closer contact with the masses, and realizing that the millions of jobless would not tolerate any further reduction in the unemployment insurance, simply dropped MacDonald cold when it became necessary for him to assume the role of a lieutenant of capitalism OUTSIDE the tanks of

This is the logical evolution of all Social-democratic betrayers of labor, Working class history has thus vomitted up the Millerands, the Briands, and Mussolinis. And thus MacDonald now no longer speaks softly or even in a whisper about the working class but shrieks nervously about "national duty"- as the patriotic "Socialists" of every country did on the eve of and during the world war. Likewise, it is welcome and instructive that MacDonald's own local (Flampstead) of the Labor party, in voting his expulsion, emphasized "his disloyalty to the Labor party and his open flouting of party discipline in joining the anti-socialist government formed for the purpose of forcing thru Parliament anti-working class legislation."

It was the report of a committee set up by the Labor party's parliamentary members themselves (the Sir May Economy Committee) that precipitated the fall of the government and the inevitable split in the Labor party. Now, the most oppressed and worst-suffering section of the British working class will be the first one to be bit in the attempt to keep the prestige and power of "sterling", of the "pound", that sordid emblen, of British capitalism. But the reduction of the unemployed insurance will only be the entering wedge, the prelude, of a drive to reduce the wages and worsen the conditions of all workers, of the whole working class. Capitalist "retrenchment" will follow along the whole line-"slewing down of all social services", wage-cutting, union-smashing, denial of civil rights, etc. Let no worker forget that it is the "Socialist" MacDonald who is still serving, in the "All-National Cabinet" as the loudspeaker for the British ruling class, championing this

From what is known of British working class history, we may therefore, look forward to a further radicalization of the working class, to a more quick growth of genuine radical sentiment in the class struggle along the whole front. In short, in the growing resistance of the masses to the new offensive of the bosses, to the axe which has been whetted for them by the MacDonald's "Economy" Committee, there will be created still more favorable ground for the growth of a mass Communist Party. For years, the Social-democrats of all countries always pointed with great raide to American imperialism as its model. From this angle, too much significance cannot be attached to the role of Wall Street in bringing decisive pressure to bear on the Bank of England and the MacDonald cabinet to cut unemployment insurance in England. American bankers brought this pressure to bear in order to help the American capitalists defeat all moves for unemployment insurance in the United States. This high-handed action of the Federal Reserve Bank will go a long way to disillusion millions of Social-democratic toilers with American imperialism and win for Wall Street the eternal hatred and damnation it deserves from every worker thruout the world.

No brush is thick enough to paint the crisis of British capitalism. The working class rights and interests are to be scuttled-shipwrecked on the hard rocks of British capitalist economic interests-IF THE MASSES WILL PERMIT IT. The masses are showing increasing resistance and militancy. Otherwise, the Hendersons and Shaws would never have broken with MacDonald. It is not loyalty to the working class-of this these burocrats are incapable of comprehending the A B Cbut only mass pressure of the workers, the fear of the wrath of the rank and file that has caused the split and differentiation in the Labor party leadership. But where is the Communist Party of Great Britain-in this acute crisis confronting the working class? Where is the Communist program to meet this situation?

In the answer to these questions lies another heart-tending tragedy for the international proletariat. The sectarian, adventurist line of the Communist Interna tional has virtually bankrupted the British and American sections and practically the entire Comintern in so far as effective utilization of the present world crisis for building a powerful victorious Communist movement is concerned. The British Communist Party is isolated from the masses. It has no contacts with the Labor party membership. The Hendersons, Shaws and Cooks will now again have a free hand to mislead millions of workers with new methods and manouvers. The paltry few hundred members of the Communist Party have deserted the mass trade unions The once powerful Minority Movement is now only a powerful memory engaged it the costly and criminal game of disrupting mass unions and putting up paper organizations parading as Red Unions which exist only in militant and revolutionary sound

Let us learn a lesson from this collapse of the MacDonald government as well as from the failure of the Communist Party of Germany to stop the growing menace of Fascism. Let us take every step necessary to make it possible to reunito the Comintern to restore it to a tactical line which will enable the various Communist Parties to fulfill their immediate and ultimate historical missions. In Reply to Dr. DuBois in "The Crisis"

Communism and the Negro

by Will Herberg

When Dr. DuBois speaks you listen and ponder. For thru the lips of Dr. DuBois speaks not only the brilliant mind that has made a unique place for itself in the American Negro world and in the world of social thought; thru his lips speaks more or less authoritatively the voice of some of the most advanced elements of the Negro petty bourgeois intellectuals, destined to play a relatively program. important role in the epical drama of Negro emancipation in this country. Dr. DoBois's rather extensive remarks in the recent issue of The Crisis (September, 1931) on "Communism and the Negro", therefore, well deserve the most thoughtful consideration of every Communist and of every one interested in the perspectives of contemporary American life.

Some Fundamental Questions

We must note in the first place that DuBois takes an unequivocal and outspoken position on the basic question the world today: Capitalism versus Šocialism,

"Present organization of industry for private profit and control of government by concentrated wealth is doonted to disaster. It most change and fall if civilization survives. The foundation of its present world-wide power is the slavery and semi-slavery of the colored world, including the American Negroes..."

The Soviet Union has in Dr. DuBois an avowed friend:

"The importance of the Russian Revo-lation cannot be gainsaid. It is easily the greatest event in the world since the French Revolution and possibly since the fall of Rome. The experiment is increa-ingly successful. (The Negro must be) sympa-thetic with Russia and hopeful of its ulti-mate success in establishing a Socialist state.

. . . The Negro Bourgeoisie and the Negro Masses

Dr. DuBois bases his whole view of he inner relation of classes in Negro soicty on three main premises: (a) The Negro bourgeoisie is very weak numetically and economically and is not the eally significant agency of the exploitation of the Negro people.

(b) The dominant leadership in the Negro field is not capitalistic.

"The attempt to dominate Negro Amer icans by purely capitalistic ideas died with Booker T. Washington . . . Since that time there has never been a montent when the dominating leadership of the American Negro has been mainly or even largely dominated by wealth or capital or by capitalistic ideals."

(c) The dominant leadership in the Negro field is made up of poor men.

"For two generations the social lead-ers of the American Negro with very lew exceptions have been poor men."

Now, it is quite true that the Negro ourgeoisie is very weak numerically and economically. It is quite true that the millions of Negro peasants and workers are being exploited not by the Negro bourgeoisie but by the white capitalists and that, fundamentally:

".... their enancipation will come from a wholesale conscipation from the grip of the white exploiters without."

Yes, the Negro bourgeoisic may itself be weak but it operates with borrowed strength---the strength of the white capitalists. The menace that the Negro bourgeoisie constitute for the Negro masses lies not in its power as an exploiting class, but in the fact that it, together with the conservative professional "race leaders" conservative professional and certain sections of the petty bour-geosic constitutes for the Negro masses of the white master class over the Negro masses. The narrow class interests of the Negro bourgeoisic and its allied conservative elements make them the eager champions of bourgeois ideals and bourgeois aspirations which are directy opposed to the deepest interests of the Negro people. The position of power and prestige within its own group, to which it is raised by the ready if somewhat contemptuous patronage of the white capitalists, makes the Negro bourgeoisie an especially dangerous factor on the Negro scene.

But, argues Dr. DuBois, the dominant eadership in the Negro field is not capitalistically inclined and has not been so since the days of Booker T. Washington. With natural diffidence, we are compelled to differ with Dr. DuBois on this crucial point. We believe an unprejudiced examination will show that the dominant leadership among the Negro people to day is still substantially of a mind with Booker T. Washington on questions of fundamental economic outlook. Dr. Car ter C. Woodson certainly represents a distinct, a significant trend in present day Negeo leadership. In a recent syndicated article "The Inconsistency of Students of Radicalism", Dr. Woodson. having "disposed of" Socialism with some indescribably silly arguments, actually makes the plea to the Negroes to make the effort to lift themselves to a capi talist status.

"... the troubles of the Negro are due largely to the fact that he does not belong to the employing class... To say that the Negro cannot develop sufficiently in the business world to measure arms with present day canitalists is to deny actual facts, to refute history. Washington, even the the cleavage on political and social questions has been much more The whole fantastic scheme of trying to build a self-contained "Negro economy" and of "utilizing our buying power" to lift the Negro masses up by heir own boot-straps, is conceived in a purely capitalistic spirit and yet it is endorsed, with considerable hestitation and qualifications, it is true, by Dr. DuBois himself (in the July 1931 Crisis)!

No. Dr. DuBois is wrong. The Negro race cannot be considered as one homogeneous mass, without class divisions and divergent class interests. white workers in America is their shameful record of discrimination against and persecution of the black man. Dr. Du Bois is quite right in emphasizing this point-it cannot, indeed, be too much emphasized. But indignation, however righteous, is surely no substitute for understanding. And it must be said that Dr. DuBois really does not understand the roots of the matter.

The masses of the white workers are so horribly afflicted with the poison of race prejudice because they are so completely subjected spiritually to the bourgeoisie, so bourgeois-minded, so "back ward". Dr. DuBois agrees that "backwardness breeds race prejudice but he understands by "backwardness" mere ignorance, illiteracy, extreme poverty and can therefore draw the conclusion:

"... the more intelligent they (the white laborers) are, the higher they rise, the more efficient they become, the more determined they are to keep Negroes under their heel."

The white worker is "backward" not because he is illiterate or "inefficient" or unskilled but because he is not class-con-scious, not conscious of his real class position and his real class interests, because he thinks in the terms of the bourgeoisie, the one hand, and the masses of the Ne-Bvery available fact, every bit of experient that a deep distinction be drawn! ence, shows us that, to the degree that the white worker becomes more class conscious, to the degree that he free hunself from the spiritual influence of hi masters, to that degree does he succeed in freeing himself also of the devastating incubus of race prejudice.
