ENFORCED HUNGER IN NATION - WIDE HEARINGS

PROBE EXTENDS TEXTILE MILL MURDER GANG CITIES IN U.S. A.

In connection with the fight against wage cuts and against unemployment a nation-wide campaign has been launched for a systematic working class exposure of starvation conditions.

The exposure is to be carried on in the form of a thorough-going investigation of working class life in the big industrial centers, among the tile uni-workers of the smaller localities and strike. in a number of important farming

The Councils of the Unemployed, with the participation of the trade unions and other workers' organizations, will direct the investigation.

Hearings Everywhere

The hearings will be held in Bir-mingham, Charlotte, New York, Chi-Philadelphia, Pittsburgh, Detroit, Cleveland, Buffalo, Bridgeport, Boston, and other places. Hearings on the conditions of agricultural workers will be held in Denver and in California and Dakota. Hearings will be held everywhere during the entire week of November 1st to 7th.

The Unemployed Councils are arranging to hold such hearings in workers' halls in working class districts. Where no regular halls under control of workers are to be obtained special efforts are being made to secure halls of any kind.

Special South Problems

The hearings in Southern centers, especially in Birmingham, have to be conducted under conditions approaching ruling class terror. But the Unemployed Councils announce that the attempt will be made to establish the right to hold an investigation of starvation conditions. Special investigations regarding the effect of the per-iodical lynch campaigns against the the Negro masses will be carried out. Also there will be definitely established the different rates of pay prevailing, showing that Negro workers get ruch lower pay for the same work, and how this system of unequal pay is used as a hammer by the bosses to rapidly beat down the wagand black

Generally, throughout the country the hearings will cover every phase of the subject. Some of these first hand experiences with evictions, local relief agencies, the charity fakes, city flop houses, breadlines, hobo camps, the stagger system, high rents, high prices, low wages, wage cuts, disease, suicides, discrimination against Negroes, youth, the foreignborn and women workers.

Relief Badly Needed

The Harlan miners are endeavoring to bring to the attention of the whole working class their starvation conditions and to expose the worst reign of terror existing anywhere in the country. It shows that the very biggest capitalist rulers of America have sanctioned organized fascist attacks against the workers in Harlan. Unless this fascist attack is met and defeated it will certainly spread not only to all mine fields but to other industries.

One of the difficulties standing in the way of extending the strike is the slowness with which relief comes in. So efficient is the relief administered that miners are being fed at a cost of but three cents a meal. Even at that rate the relief thus far has not been sufficient.

Workers everywhere must rally to the relief of the Harlan miners. Otherwise they can look at Harlan today and see a picture of what is going to face them tomorrow.

Robinson Circus Kills Worker For Demanding Pay

MOBILE, Ala.-Two days ago, twenty-five Negro and white workers arrived here all bruised and ragged. They had been thrown off a train fourteen miles away, by the bosses of the circus for which they were working. The bosses had offered to pay them one dollar for their week's work. When they protested against such robbery, they were attacked with blackjacks and kicked off the Robinson circus train without a cent. One of the Negro workers has died of his injuries.

In their starva-tion schemes the bosses have the full cooperation of their loyal agents, the A. F. of L. officials, the Musteites and the Socialist Party.

The third winter of the economic crisis is approaching. More hunger and misery, evictions and wage cuts are facing us. It was the Communist Party of this country which led the monster demonstration of March 6, in the organization of the Unemployed Councils to lead the struggles against evictions, for immediate relief, for unemployment insurance, as well as or ganizing the workers in the struggle against wage cuts, stagger system and

More than three out of every hun-dred native-born whites ten years of than for his more immediate blood age or over are illiterate in Knoxville. Of ninety-three cities in the United States Knoxville ranks highest in native-born white illiterates. Chattanooga ranks second. The percentage of Negro illiteracy is 11.6 a hundred, about the average for the South. The illiteracy among Negroes is due to the vicious discrimination against them by the white ruling class and the bribed and corrupted elements in the ranks of the Negro professors, preachers, bootleggers and others.

Bishop Indicted On Election Fraud

Bishop James Cannon, Jr., of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, and a woman whom he calls his "political secretary" have been indicted by the federal grand jury at Washington D. C., for violation of the corrupt practices law. The woman is Ada L. Burroughs.

The indictment of Cannon, one of the most rabid fundamentalists and prohibitionists, and one of the pillars of the Southern ruling class, grew out of his misuse of funds during the 1928 presidential election campaign.

Heads Part of Reaction Cannon, a bishop of the Methodist church, plays an important part in keeping the southern white masses in a state of illiteracy or semi-illiteracy, They is opposed to every advance of modern science, being a rabid antievolutionist, is a supporter of Ku Klux vi-olence against the Negro masses and white workers who dare try to think for themselves.
