'Liberated' by Bush and Blair...







THE BRUTALITY OF INPERIALISM

REMEMBER when Bush and Blair promised they would use 'precision weapons' to fight a 'clean war'?

On March 24th, Blair said, 'We want to minimise the suffering of ordinary Iraqi people. This is a war not of conquest but liberation.'

But these horrific pictures show the reality. This is what lies behind the smooth talk from 'embedded' media correspondents who treat war as a 24-hour news show.

This is not an offensive 'directed solely at Saddam Hussein's regime'. The military targets are

now the civilian population.

These children were blasted by the swooping F-16s of the US Air Force as waves of jets targeted Basra. At least 50 Iraqis were killed and 366 injured as the planes bombed the city with weapons including cluster bombs.

These are the weapons of mass destruction Bush and Blair do not talk about. Those killed included two young children. Four were victims from one family.

The pictures of the dead we show (and some much worse) were freely available to newspapers and television stations.

But they were not used—because the pictures show Blair and Bush are war criminals.

Since the early attacks, the war has gotten worse.

The Anglo-American forces have declared that Basra, a city of 1.5 million people, was "a legitimate military target". It is now a free-fire zone for troops, tanks and aircraft.

Murdered

On Friday last weekend, 62 civilians were murdered in Baghdad. Not once - but twice - did US bombs hit people whose only crime was to shop in a market.

As Robert Fisk pointed out the injured were taken to hospitals without computers, with only the most primitive of X ray machines because of the previous policy of sanctions.

But the missiles were guided by the most sophisticated computers devised by the Pentagon.

As resistance grows, the US and Britain are replying with even more terrible weapons. They will bring more death and suffering rather than contemplate the thought of defeat for their imperial project.

British Tornado war planes have already been upgraded to use special "bunker-busting" missiles named Storm Shadow. They cost nearly £1 million each and are designed to penetrate protective concrete. If they hit civilian shelters they will cause a horrendous massacre.

The forerunner of the Storm Shadow killed up to 1,000 people in the Amariya shelter in Baghdad in 1991.

US and British generals want to terrorise the civilian population into fleeing cities. They will then pretend to welcome them with 'humanitarian aid'.

This is the sick reality of a colonial war being fought by the terrorists of the White House and Downing Street.

EXPOSING WAR LIES AND PROPAGANDA

The lie machine

But Al Jazeera said nothing had happened and this was later confirmed by the Supreme Council of the Islamic Revolution – one of the main Shia organisations.

But the story came from a correspondent of the Jerusalem Post which has Richard Perle on its board of directors. It was a straight lie.

■ Blair claimed that two British soldiers, Sapper Like Allsopp and Staff Sergeant Cullingworth, had been executed by

He said 'it was an act of cruelty beyond all human comprehension.'

Two days later Downing Street apologised to the soldiers' families after they revealed that army superiors had denied executions had taken place.

■ The US is now attacking media organisations to stop the flow of information.

They bombed Baghdad's telecommunication system.

They destroyed the Iraq Ministry of Information which provided facilities to many foreign jour-

Even the website of Al Jazeera was sabotaged.



Iraq opposition turns against the US

EVEN THE official Iraqi opposition is turning against Bush even though it originally welcomed his war.

"There is a difference between a war of liberation and a war of conquest. Liberation means Iraqis are at the forefront.

"Conquest means the invaders are in charge," said Hoshyar Zubari, an official of the Kurdistan Democratic Party, one of five groups recognised by the Bush Administration as allied opposition forces

"There's a total lack of Iraqi involvement," said Zaab Sethna, an aide to Ahmed Chalabi, who heads the Iraqi National Congress, an opposition group based in London.

We have been surprised over the months the lack of cooperation with the opposi-

The Supreme Council for the Islamic Revolution in Iraq, a Shia group based in Iran, said the Bush administration has shared none of its plans with the opposition.

Neutral

Its leader, Mohammed Bakir Hakim, told Iraqi Shiites to remain neutral in the

"We are not in favour of this war because it places the future of Iraq in foreign hands," he told reporters in Tehran.

Meanwhile Iraq's most senior Shia religious leader, Ayatollah Sistani, has issued a call to resist US forces. It was ignored in the Western press as they pretended that there was a popular uprising in the Shia stronghold of Basra.

A number of companies in Ireland are profiting from the war.

The company claims that its factory does not produce arms in Derry, a claim rejected by the Foyle Ethical Investment Campaign who peacefully occupied the fac-tory and hung banners from the windows until removed by the police.

Other Irish companies engaged in the arms industry include ParthusCeva who produce global positioning chips for the U.K. Ministry of Defence and Timoney Technology, the Navan based company which produces suspension systems and remote control vehicles.

THE U.S. claims it went to war to stop Iraq using 'weapons of mass destruction'. But they are already using weapons of mass destruction.

One such weapon is cluster bombs.

Cluster bombs break up into hundreds of small bomblets, causing devastation over a wide area. Many then lie around and act as landmines.

In previous wars, such as in Kosovo and Afghanistan, US forces used cluster bombs.

IT'S RIGHT TO RESIST THE U.S. EMPIRE Thousands of Iraqis are streaming back into their country and volunteering to fight, according to Sunday Tribune reporter Harry McGee in Amman, Jordan. Most of them had fled the pover-

ty and terror of Saddam's regime. But

they see the Anglo-American invasion as a catastrophe.

McGee reports how one man summed up the feeling "I do not like Saddam but if I am asked, I will become a 'fedayeen'. I am from Nasiriyah. I have watched what the Americans have done

to my city. They say they come to liberate us but they want to kill us."

It is this spirit of resistance that has unnerved the US empire. Their overwhelming military superiority convinced. whelming military superiority convinced

them that they were invincible.

US arrogance was most sharply expressed Donald Rumsfeld's concept of a 'revolution in military affairs'.

This argued for a swift movement of 'lighter' US troops who would be backed up by a psycops operation to convince their enemies that defeat was inevitable.

Calculate

But Rumsfeld did not calculate on an anti-imperialist mood that has led thousands of civilians to join in attacks on US

'This is not the enemy we war-gamed against' said General William Wallace the US most senior ground commander in Iraq. He certainly had not figured on Iraqi farmers shooting down US Apache helicopters or massive civilian resistance.

The US now has to call in an extra 100,000 troops to crush the Iraqis. And according to Russian intelligence reports

which rely on electronic evesdropping, the US will now switch from so called precision bombs to 'scorched earth tactics and carpet bombing campaign' to win the war.

The escalation in the numbers of troops and the shift to carpet bombing was exactly what occurred during the long drawn conflict in Vietnam.

The anti-war movement should welcome the resistance of the Iraqi people. The more it grows and spreads throughout the Arab world, the world difficult it will be for Bush to invade other coun-

Threatened

If Bush had gotten away with a short war, then every country that dared to cancel its debt or nationalised a US multi-national could be threatened.

This is why to back the call 'our troops' now that the war has begun, which was made by a speaker at the ICTU rally in Belfast recently was wrong.

And so too is the media talk about getting 'the job over as soon as possible' as if dropping cluster bombs and hitting conscript soldiers with depleted uranium could be compared to 'a job' to be

The more the resistance against Bush spreads from Baghdad to Arab cities and to the Western anti-war movement the better is the future for all of us.

Close Shannon to US troops!

ONE THIRD of the US reenforcements to defeat Iraq will come through Shannon. Up to 1,500 US troops will use the airport every day on their way to wrack murder and slaughter on innocent people.

The Irish government is now involved in a major back up oper-

ation for the US military.

Last week Donald Rumsfeld declared that Syria was engaged in a 'hostile act' against the US because it let 'night goggles' go through its country to Iraq.

But it is a much more 'hostile act' against the Iraq people to allow trained killers re-fuel at Shannon and then deploy the Irish army to protect them from the embarrassment of any protests.

Bertie Ahern's position is no longer tenable.



The problem, however, is that a small clique around Bush have outlined precisely that imperialist scheme in speeches and conferences over the last 20 years.

The main channel is the Project for the New American Century, founded in 1997 by William Kristol, the editor of a hard right establishment magazine.

Most of the Project's members were part of Ronald Reagan's regime in the US in the early 1980s.

Now they are part of George Bush's government and set the course of the US

They include vice-president Dick Cheney, defence secretary Donald Rumsfeld and his deputy Paul Wolfowitz. Zalmay Khalilzad also signed up to the Pro-

He currently plays governor general to the US-imposed colonial administration in Afghanistan and is lined up for a similar post in northern Iraq

The people now directing the US state cut their teeth in the early 1980s, revelling in the huge increase in arms spending under Ronald Reagan.

Chillingly, they believe people such as Henry Kissinger, the architect of saturation bombing in Vietnam, were far too

Some, such as John Negroponte and Elliot Abrams, organised the right wing death squads that murdered tens of thousands of people in Central America throughout the 1980s.

They all entered the 1990s fretting that US economic power was declining relative to Europe and Japan.

They had won the "Second Cold War" against Russia, but now feared a loss of US global power.

So they organised through the Project and other outfits to rally support within the establishment for a crusade to establish total US power.

Their argument was direct-the US should use its unrivalled military machine to shape the world to benefit US econom-

As the Project's founding statement put it in 1997, "We are living off the capital-both military investments and the foreign policy achievements-built up by past administrations. "It is increasingly difficult to sustain

American influence around the world." They agitated for a hike in arms spending. They demanded war against Iraq as a prelude to attacking other "rogue states" to demonstrate the military power of the

The Project's Rebuilding America's Defenses document in September 2000

"The United States is the world's only superpower, combining pre-eminent military power, global technological leadership, and the world's largest economy...

"At present the United States faces no global rival. America's grand strategy should aim to preserve and extend this advantageous position as far into the

"There are, however, potentially pow-

Seeing off any strategic rivals while enforcing free market policies abroad means giving US multinationals a great advantage in the global chase for profit.

It strengthens the hands of US negotiators as they sit down to discuss trade deals and International Monetary Fund loans to the other countries. That is the prize the Bush gang has in

its sights with every advance towards Baghdad.

These people now run the most powerful state on earth.

They have a policy to preserve and extend US capitalism. The rest of the US establishment, despite tactical and ideological disagreements, is happy to go along with that strategy if it delivers.

Their grisly record of organising torture

US defence secretary He was a favourite of US president Richard Nixon in the Vietnam War. He then became chief of staff and

efence secretary in the 1970s to Nixon's successor, Gerald Ford. In the 1980s Rumsfeld was US president Ronald Reagan's special envoy to the Middle East. In 1983 he met Saddam Hussein to conclude a deal to supply US weapons to help

The US State Department dmitted at the time "available evidence indicates that Iraq has used lethal chemical weapons" in that war with Iran. The Los Angeles Times in 1991 reported that USsupplied helicopters "were among those dropping the deadly bombs in Saddam Hussein's 1988 poison gas attack on Kurds in the town of

More recently Rumsfeld led the US Congress committee pushing the "Star Wars" National Missile Defence system

JOHN NEGROPONTE US ambassador to the UN

From 1964 Negroponte was a key aide in the US embassy in Vietnam. He was then a key adviser from 1971 to 1973 to Henry Kissinger, and was in charge of Vietnam policy on the US National Security Council. In the 1980s he was charged with

"carrying out the covert strategy of the Reagan administration to crush the Sandinista government in Nicaragua", according to the New

As US ambassador to neighbouring Honduras he oversaw an expansion of US military aid to the right wing government from \$4 million to \$77 million. Negroponte helped organise and train
Honduras's infamous Battalion 3-16. involved with. The US Baltimore Sun paper exposed how "The CIA and US embassy knew of numerous crimes including murder and torture committed by Battalion 3-16, yet

continued to collaborate closely


PAUL WOLFOWITZ Deputy defence secretary

He was also an undersecretary for defence under George Bush Senior. In the 1980s Wolfowitz was US ambassador to Indonesia. He described the Indonesian dictator General Suharto as "a model of moderation". Wolfowitz ensured US military help for Suharto's regime while it was occupying East Timor in defiance of UN resolutions. Some 300,000 were killed in that

In the wake of 11 September 2001 Volfowitz openly called for the US to se military might to "end states" which threatened its interests. Wolfowitz argues the US must be ready to confront, with force if needed, its "major strategic competitor and potential threat"-China. Wolfowitz is also on the

ncluding Hasbro, a major investor in sweatshop factories across Asia.

RICHARD PERLE former Chair of Bush's Defence Policy Board

Perle opposes any nuclear arms control agreements and enthusiastically supports the US being prepared to wage nuclear war.

Perie is a director of the shadowy venture capital firm Trireme Partners. It invests in companies dealing in "homeland security" technology and services. It has lucrative deals in Saudi Arabia and

Perle ominously declared the US "must develop a strategy to contain France" because of its refusal to back war on Iraq.

Last week, Perle was forced to resign because of a scandal over how he used his position to the Defence Policy Board to gain contracts for businesses he was

He is the member of Bush's National Security Council responsible for the Middle East, as director of the office of "democracy, human rights and

international operations" Abrams was found guilty of lying to Congress to cover up US organising and financing of the right wing terrorist Contra organisation in

Nicaragua in the 1980s. The Contras murdered, raped and terrorised civilians, killing up to 40,000 people, in their war against the Sandinista government. Abrams was only saved from jail by a pardon

issued by George Bush Senior in his last days of office. Abrams was also involved in US intervention in El Salvador in the 1980s which he called a "fabulous achievement". Between 1980 and 1989 death squads organised by the US-backed government murdered 41,048 civilians, according to an

official investigation. Abrams gave the go-ahead to an attempted coup in April last year against Venezuela's elected

WILLIAM KRISTOL

He was a junior member of Ronald Reagan's administration and chief of staff to Bush Senior's vice-president

Dan Quayle.
Kristol was also paid at least \$100,000 to act as an adviser to the Enron energy corporation which collapsed amid a huge corruption

scandal two years ago.

Kristol said the US government deliberately "allowed Saddam to suppress the rebellion" of Iraqi Shias and Kurds after the 1991 Gulf

He admitted that the US and the Saudi Arabian regime did not "want to establish the principle that a regime should be removed by

popular uprisings". Kristol unashamedly calls himself an "American imperialist".

Colonialism's bloody record inIraq

he U.S. and the U.K. have been surprised by the level of resistance they have met in Iraq. Instead of being greeted as liberators, they are being fought against as invaders.

The explanation offered the spin doctors in the White House and Westminster is that the population are held back by terror, that the Ba'ath Party is holding the population in check.

But Saddam's regime would be incapable of preventing mass uprisings, especially in the South, if the population were seriously intent on moving against him.

The reality is that the majority of the population have a greater anger at the imperialist powers than they have at Saddam's dictatorship. This anti-colonial feeling exists right across the Arab world. It has the potential to bring catastrophe to the plans of Bush and Blair.

Hostility to the imperial powers extends back to the early Twentieth Century. Colonel Nasser, the Egyptian national revolutionary of the 1950's gave an illustration of the broad hostility to Britain at the time of his youth, when he wrote, "I remember a cry I used to repeat when I was a little child every time I saw an aeroplane flying overhead. I used to shout O God Almighty, I wish a calamity to overtake the English."

The roots of anti-imperialist feeling ;ie in the robbery of oil.

On May 26th 1908 oil was struck in Persia, jetting fifty feet out of the barren ground. It was the first unleashing of enormous oil wealth that lay beneath the desert.

By contrast with U.S. oil, which has to be pumped out, at the average rate of 11 gallons a day per oil well, the Middle Eastern oil pumped itself out at an astonishing average of 4,000 gallons a day per oil well.

The discovery of these oil fields coincided with the run up to the Great War and the need of the major powers to acquire oil in order to fight each other. As the French President, Clemenceau put it at the time, 'oil is as necessary as blood."

The British government shared the British. his view. 'The allies floated to victory on a wave of oil' said Lord Curzon after the war.

During WW1 the British secured control of Iraq after they met little opposition from Arab armies who were supposed to fight for the hated Ottoman empire.

Sir Stanley Maude led British troops into Baghdad in March 1917. His successful invasion, after earlier defeats, was designed to secure the oil-rich and strategically important

Maude was dubbed "the liberator" - by the British, that is. Nobody asked the Iragis what they thought.

Many Iraqis wanted to see the back of the Ottoman Empire but they were wary of the British, especially when they discovered details of a secret plan to carve up Iraq and Syria between Britain and France. The Iragis were right to be suspicious. Talk of "liberation" soon turned to the harsh realities of a conquest.

ritain extracted a mandate to run Iraq from the League of Nations, forerunner of the United Nations. One historian called this "a legalistic cloak of respectability for its partition of the Middle East"

The British created a colonialstyle administration in Iraq. It was run by Sir Percy Cox and his assistant Gertrude Bell.

These two upper class colonialists prided themselves on their deep understanding of the Arab people. Gertrude Bell wrote, "On two points they are all agreed. They want us to control their affairs and they want Sir Percy as high commissioner." She was wrong on both counts.

Bell declared the Iraqis "uncivilised tribes" but she was confident they would learn to love her. "There is no doubt they are turning to us," she gushed in a letter in June

Just one month later the Iraqi people united in revolt against Sir Percy, Gertrude Bell and the rest of

Iraqis stormed garrisons, killed some British soldiers and captured some towns. The British unleashed terror against the rebels and punitive raids against the local population.

A British colonel, Gerald Leachman, declared, "The only way to deal with the tribes is wholesale slaughter." T E Lawrence, Lawrence of Arabia, wrote, "We have killed ten thousand Arabs in this rising this summer. We cannot hope to maintain such an average-it is a poor, sparsely populated country."

ut repression simply deepened the revolt. It took five months and 8,000 Iraqi lives for the British to crush the rebellion. Minister for the colonies Winston Churchill moaned that subduing the locals was "eating up troops and

He discovered a cheaper method dropping poison gas from aeroplanes. The British launched one of the first ever full-scale aerial gas bombardments on thousands of men, women and children. Churchill brushed aside those who questioned the morality of poison gas.

'We shouldn't be stopped by the prejudices of those who don't think clearly," he said. "I am strongly in favour of using poisoned gas against uncivilised tribes." He declared that the gas had "an excellent moral effect" on the locals. The British found it easy to kill Iraqis, but it was harder to kill the dream of Arab free-

The British imposed a king on Iraq. Only a few Iraqis had ever heard of Prince Faisal - and those

who had didn't want him as their

The British installed him with great pomp and circumstance.

They organised a vote in which 96 percent backed King Faisal, a result that would make many modern dictators blush.

The first thing King Faisal did was sign a treaty with the British giving them military and economic control over Iraq. But mass opposition to the British regime continued to run

■he British established an Iraqi army, led by British officers, to make sure the local people were kept in their place.

In 1930 the British foisted a new treaty on Iraq which meant they could continue to keep troops in the region to protect their growing interest in Iraqi oil.

This was the price the regime in London exacted from Baghdad before Britain ended its mandate over the area in 1932.

Opposition to the British controlled monarch never abated. In 1941, army officers staged a coup but were put down eventually with British guns. British control of Iraq

weakened after the Suez crisis and US influence grew.

Pressure for greater Iraqi control over oil revenue continued to grow and fuelled nationalists sentiment.

This led to an uprising in 1948 that first forced the government to repudiate a new 20-year agreement with Britain.

US influence began to grow in the region after World War 2 and eventually began to replace the

espite having one of the largest communist parties in the Middle East, Iraq was forced to join an anti-communist alliance known as the Baghdad pact

In 1958, however, nationalist tensions exploded when the Iraqi army, which Britain had created, launched

They killed the pro-British king and prime minister, invaded the British Embassy and tore down the statue of Sir Stanley Maude "the liberator".

The RAF bases were closed and Iraq withdrew from the sterling bloc in which its currency had been tied to the pound.

The new regime was led by Abd al-Kassem Quassim who took an independent nationalist stance.

This was regarded as a threat by Britain and the US and they encouraged opposition to his rule. In 1959 Quassim was wounded in an assassination attempt and one of his assassins was Saddam Hussein.

Finally 1963 Kassem was finally overthrown in a CIA sponsored coup. Just like the Iran Prime Minister Mossadeq who wanted to nationalise the oil industry he was a threat to Western interests.

As US and British forces again invade Iraq under the guise of bringing 'liberation' there can be few Iragis who are unaware of their own history of colonial oppression. This is one reason why resistance to Anglo-American imperialism is growing.

A military snuff movie

THE 24 hour wall-towall news coverage of the invasion of Iraq is like a military snuff movie.

The American networks and SKY News bring breathless 'reports' from embedded journalists giving first hand observations of the US/UK 'liberation' of

The reporters who are now in bed with the American Military Machine jump on any scrap of misinformation, which the US Generals decide to "let slip".

Thus sketchy reports of 'popular uprising' in Basra in seconds become "a mass popular uprising against the rule of Saddam in Basra" as Sky News flashed it across its screen.

Within 24 hours, even British Generals were privately saying that there was no basis for the story and it had originated with, you guessed it, an "overexcited embedded reporter 30 miles outside Basra".

The desecration of the English language is also continuing apace as the newsreaders make the horrific and obscene seem almost palatable and clini-

Parroted

We had become used to the term collateral damage (civilians killed) from the first Gulf War. But the glossary of terms used by the US military and faithfully parroted by the media is growing by the day.

'Mopping up resistance' means house-to-house raids in small Iraqi villages to find and kill those providing resistance to the inva-

'Surgical Strike' is an aerial attack on the centre of an Iraqi city.

'Irregular forces' are Iraqi fighters who do not fight "fair" by coming out in the open to be massacred.

Media corporations are owned by a handful of international media barons. FOX and SKY are controlled by Rupert Murdock who also owns the most pro-war British papers.

In the US, Fox television employs Oliver North as a correspondent. North was sacked from a previous US administration for running guns to Contra terrorists in Nicaragua, which were purchased from drugs money.

Yet despite the fact that the capitalist owned media continually produces lies, many people can see through it.

Give us proper cancer services! Waterford Trades Council

UP TO 500 people took to the streets last weekend to demand properly funded cancer services.

In a loud and lively demonstration through Dublin's city centre, protesters called for proper breast screening facilities and regional radiotherapy centres.

Protesters came from Monaghan, Mayo, Cork, Galway, Waterford and Dublin.

There was strong trade union representation with banners from SIPTU and the Waterford Trades Council while David Begg from the

ICTU addressed the crowd. Mary from Castlebar explained why she had travelled for the march "We have good doctors in our local hospital

but no chemotherapy services. If cancer is caught in time it can be very curable but people down the country, in particular, are facing long delays in accessing treatment.

Old People and people who are often far too sick to travel are forced to make a weekly journey to Dublin for treatment that may take only five minutes to administer.'

"Many people end up having to stay overnight—machines for radiotherapy often break down, or they may just feel too ill to travel—but if you don't have relations in Dublin you end up spending your savings on B&B.

Priorities

"I feel very strongly that the services in Dublin should be for Dublin people. There's plenty of money in the country—it's just a question of priorities. I say health before government jets!"

Meanwhile the Waterford Trades Council have called a two hour stoppage over the lack of cancer services in the South East Region.

The stoppage takes place on Wednesday April 2nd and

there will be a march through the city.

Nurses in Waterford will be also taking a half day's strike action this week to demand a radiotherapy unit for the South

They have the full backing of local people. As one protester from Waterford said "We have the worst cancer services in Europe. Its time we all did what we can to change that".

The obscenity of spending vast quantities of money on war at a time when basic healthcare is not provided in either the West or the developing world was not lost on many of the participants.

Carrying a "Health care not Warfare" placard one man said "It sums up how obscene the priorities of this world are at the moment. I hope Bertie Ahern is listening. He should pay a bit more attention to serving the people who elected him and less time sucking up to

WATER RATES WILL BE RESISTED

ATTEMPTS by the government to introduce charges for household water in Northern Ireland will be met with resistance.

This is the message from Communities Against the Water Tax, a group recently set up following a meeting held by the

Cliftonville community.

Opposition to the charges has brought together community groups, trade unions, local politicians and others such as the Northern Ireland Anti Poverty Network (NIAPN).

A statement released by Communities Against the Water Tax said, "Local families will face water charges of at least £250 a year. Households here

already pay for water services in their local rates. We reject this double taxation.

Recognising the likely impact of charges Frances Dowds of the Northern Ireland Anti-Poverty Network told Socialist Worker "The Network calls for resistance to the potential introduction of metering which could impact seriously on larger households or those with caring duties (children or older people) who would have greater call on such essential services".

Trade unions are also opposed to the introduction of water rates and are actively involved in building the opposition.

Socialist Worker spoke to Pat Torley a TGWU Union Rep in the Water

Service who said "We have been liaising with various organisations in England and Wales in order to use their knowledge on the effects of the introduction of water rates.

Examples

'We have heard many examples of how people were forced to stop flushing their toilet simply because they could not afford to pay their water bills."

It is the NI Anti-Poverty Network's opinion that water and sewerage are basic human needs and they should be provided free from the state.".

The privatisation of water is part of global strategy by big business to open up even the basic

necessities of life to the whims and dictates of the free market.

It has also met with opposition. In huge Bolivia, for example, water privatisation led to strikes and riots until it was withdrawn.

Similar meetings to the one held in Cliftonville are at a planning stage. Here in Northern Ire-

land, opposition is grow-

PARENTS and healthcare workers are taking to the streets of

Dublin on Saturday 5th April, to protest against cuts in hospital maternity services, in a march organised by the National Birth

The organisers are protesting against plans to close up to 12 of the country 's maternity units. and to cut maternity beds by more than a third in the next two

The National Birth Alliance says the cutbacks will put thousands of women's lives at risk as well as jeopardising the lives of newly born babies and further industrialising birth.

Under the plans, the three main

Dublin hospitals are to be "re-located" to acute hospital sites outside the city cen-

tre.

For many women without private transport, it will mean undue hardship.

Other maternity units which have been identified as being at risk include Mullingar, Ballinasloe, Tralee, Kilkenny, Clonmel and Wexford.

Units not yet named may also close. Shutting units such as Portlaoise and Mullingar will put increased pressure on maternity beds in the big Dublin hospitals, already bursting at the seams.

According to the Economic and Social Research Institute Report for the Department of Health and Children that has just been published, Ireland's perinatal mortality rates (stillbirths plus first week of life deaths) are now the worst in the European Union.
