

# PALESTINE COMMUNISTS URGE JEWISH APPEAL TO UN

**JERUSALEM (By Mail).**—Jewish labor in Palestine must demand UN Security Council action to stem British terror, the Palestine Communist Party has urged in an appeal to the executive committee of Histadruth, the Jewish Federation of Labor.

"The outrages committed by the British Army, the killed and the wounded, the mass arrests, the arrest of Histadruth and Jewish Agency leaders are a new expression of the policy of colonial oppression in our country," the letter said.

"Considering the situation, when peace has been disrupted in Palestine, we turn to you with the following demands: to summon an urgent meeting of the Histadruth Congress and to pass there the following resolutions concerning the present situation.

- "To transfer the decision of the future of our country from the hands of British or Anglo-American imperialism to the Security Council of the UN.

## END EMERGENCY LAWS

- "To demand the immediate abrogation of the fatal emergency laws which deliver the inhabitants of Palestine to the mercy of any British soldier or policeman.

- "To stop the system of wanton arrests, and to set all prisoners free.

- "To pay compensation for the damage and destruction done to private and public property.

- "To demand investigation of the acts of murder and destruction

committed by Army action.

## STOP CURFEWS

- "To abrogate the system of collective punishment of imposing curfew on the Yishuv.

- "To mobilize the full force of the Histadruth against the intrigues of the imperialist cliques which cause clashes between Arabs and Jews, economic crises and unemployment.

- "To ask the support of the World Federation of Trade Unions for the implementation of these demands.

- "We emphasize the most urgent need particularly of the demand to transfer to the problem of our country to the Security Council of the UN as the only way to safeguard peace under the present conditions."
